Sustainability Appraisal Report

Introduction

1. Sustainability Appraisal is an integral part of the process for preparing Supplementary Planning Documents (SPDs). It is about making sure that, by carrying out the proposals set out in such planning documents, the aim of sustainable development is achieved. To achieve sustainable development the Government has 4 objectives:

- Social progress which recognises the needs of everyone
- Effective protection of the environment
- Prudent use of natural resources and
- Maintenance of high and stable levels of economic growth and employment

2. The contribution to sustainable development is a key aim of planning. Sustainable development is simply about ensuring a better quality of life for everyone now and for future generations. A widely used definition was drawn up by the World Commission on Environment and Development in 1987:

‘development that meets the needs of the present without compromising the ability of future generations to meet their own needs’.

3. In applying the principles of sustainable development the Council must consider how its planning documents address the four Government objectives. They should seek to achieve outcomes that enable social, environmental and economic objectives are reached together over time. Sustainability appraisal is a tool for achieving this aim.

Summary and Outcomes

4. Sustainability Appraisal is a way of ensuring that the potential economic, social and environmental effects of the proposed Quorn Village Design Statement SPD are identified and measures are taken to remedy any detrimental effects. The SPD proposes to guide the design of new development to enhance the existing environment, while meeting the need for change. The alternative would be a ‘business as usual’ approach which is likely to result in less locally sensitive schemes of new development.

5. Quorn makes a significant visual contribution to the quality of the Soar valley landscape. A wide, flat valley bottom with villages located on the slightly higher ground of the valley sides. Boundaries and field pattern which vary from the very open areas devoid of hedgerows which are typical of the old Lammas meadows to the smaller pastures defined by hedgerows with mature hedgerow trees. All are part of the cherished local scene. The village has been designated a conservation area, and contains a number of Listed Buildings and several other significant historic buildings.

6. The policies of the Quorn Village Design Statement SPD have been assessed individually against the sustainability objectives to measure their likely economic, social and environmental effects. No negative effects were identified. The SPD scores several

positive effects for the sustainability objectives. Significant positive effects are scored for four of the 27 objectives relating to:

- maintaining and enhancing biodiversity, flora and fauna;
- maintaining and enhancing the landscape and townscape character;
- conserving and enhancing where appropriate the historic and cultural environment; and
- Ensure that housing stock meets the housing needs of all parts of the community.

7. In terms of the environment objectives there are no significant negative or positive effects for minimising water consumption and conserving soil resources. Similarly, in terms of material assets, the objectives relating to extraction, re-use and recycling of minerals and aggregates and managing waste do not score any significant effect.
8. The social objectives generally do not show significant negative or positive effects. The exception is that there will be marginally positive effects in terms of the provision to reduce contributions to climate change, encouraging access to the countryside, promote vibrant and viable settlements. However, these effects are less likely to have such an impact for the wider population of Charnwood.
9. Economic objectives do not show significant or marginally significant negative or positive effects
10. In summary, the recommendations relate to design and construction techniques which consider the wider economic, social and environmental implications must be adequately promoted by the policies of the SPD. Design techniques to address the issues listed below should be added to the policies of this SPD and/or reference made to the Leading in Design SPD:
 - protecting water quality and reducing water consumption;
 - protection and re-use of soils;
 - designing for less car use, energy efficient design and use of renewable energy to reduce greenhouse gas emissions;
 - ensure new developments are adaptable to temperature change;
 - reduce, re use and recycling of minerals and aggregates resources used as building materials;
 - reducing, re-use and recycling of waste materials;
11. Quorn Village Design Statement SPD will be monitored through a single system for monitoring Charnwood's Development Framework.
12. The SPD will be amended to take account of this Sustainability Appraisal after the consultation period and prior to final publication. The key differences the Sustainability Appraisal process has made are:
 - highlighting a number of gaps in terms of policy references to sustainable design and construction. It is recommended that such references are added to bring the policies of the SPD in line with its stated objectives with regard to energy efficiency and undertaking development in an environmentally sustainable manner.
 - Recommending reference is made to the use of the Leading in Design SPD in terms of guidance for sustainable design and construction techniques.

How to Comment

13. The Council has produced this Sustainability Appraisal Report to accompany publication of the draft *Quorn Village Design Statement SPD* for consultation.
14. The findings of this sustainability appraisal along with any consultation responses will be taken into account prior to finalising the *Quorn Village Design Statement SPD*. Any significant and valid responses requiring changes will have to be subject to sustainability appraisal to ensure that there will be no significant economic, social and environmental effects.

Appraisal Methodology

17. The Council has developed with the help of Halcrow Group Ltd an approach to Sustainability Appraisal which is at the heart of preparing the Local Development Framework from the outset of developing the constituent Development Plan Documents (DPD) and Supplementary Planning Documents (SPD).
18. The Planning and Compulsory Purchase Act 2004 makes Sustainability Appraisal a requirement for Development Plan Documents and Supplementary Planning Documents. Alongside this is the requirement to undertake environmental assessment of plans and programmes through the European Directive 2001/42/EC. Regulations on Local Development (SI 2004/2204) and the Environmental Assessment of Plans and Programmes (SI 2004/1633) as well as draft Government guidance on sustainability appraisal have also been taken into account in developing an approach. This includes the following stages:
 - Setting the context, objectives and baseline data
 - Developing and refining options
 - Appraising the effects of the draft DPD or SPD
 - Consultation on the Sustainability Report and draft DPD or SPD
 - Monitoring the implementation of the DPD or SPD
19. The approach adopted for this Sustainability Appraisal Report follows the method developed by Halcrow Group Ltd for Sustainability Appraisal of the documents comprising Charnwood's Development Framework. Work on the sustainability appraisal for this SPD did not begin until after an initial key stakeholder consultation had taken place, and therefore, it was not possible to carry out early stakeholder consultation on

the scope of the Appraisal. Given the stage the draft SPD has reached it is not considered appropriate to carry out a separate consultation on the scope of the sustainability appraisal for this SPD. The Sustainability Appraisal Report focuses on the SPD. However, if you wish to comment on the scope of the appraisal you may do so at this stage.

20. The Sustainability Appraisal for the *Quorn Village Design Statement* SPD was undertaken by Council officers in December 2007.
21. An initial stakeholder consultation for the *Quorn Village Design Statement* SPD was undertaken in 2007 prior to the Sustainability Appraisal. This involved contacting natural England (formally the Countryside Agency and English Nature), English Heritage and Environment Agency and other key stakeholders by letter and requesting their views.

Background

22. The Sustainability Appraisal will measure the policies set out in the *Quorn Village Design Statement* SPD against a number of sustainability objectives to establish whether there will be any significant economic, social or environmental effects. Where necessary consideration will be given to revising policy or applying measures to tackle unwanted effects. This Sustainability Report sets out how the sustainability report was undertaken, the results of the appraisal and the recommendations for amendment to policy.
23. The purpose of the *Quorn Village Design Statement* SPD is to establish the key design principles and features that are intrinsic qualities that make Quorn distinctive and to use that to guide new development in the village.
24. The objectives of the guide are:
 - To ensure that the natural environment is conserved by encouraging the preservation of protected species and their habitats;
 - To protect the Charnwood Forest landscape by ensuring that new developments are contained within the existing village roof line to protect views and vistas;
 - To protect the boundaries, connections, pathways and verges that are so important to the distinctive character of the village;
 - To ensure that new developments complement the scale, mix and density of existing buildings;
 - To encourage the retention of trees that are an important element within the village environment and ensure appropriate planting in new developments ;
 - To ensure the design of new development complements the existing styles and materials of existing village buildings, while also welcoming high quality and courageous contemporary design.
 - To encourage the same design consideration to be given equally to small alterations and major new developments.
25. Appendix I signposts the components of this Sustainability Report which make up the Environmental Report for the purposes of complying with the Strategic Environmental Assessment Directive (2001/42/EC).

Sustainability Objectives, Baseline Data and Context

26. Quorn Village Design Statement SPD has been prepared in the context of the Borough of Charnwood Local Plan policy EV/1, about design. It indicates that the Borough Council will seek to ensure a high standard of design in all new developments. The policy sets out a number of criteria against which new development proposals will be judged. The explanatory text refers to the production of design guides to outline the key defining local characteristics for various parts of the Borough. However, the SPD will also take into account other relevant policies of the adopted Local Plan.
27. The Community Strategy sets out the vision of the whole community and the Corporate Plan the action plan for the Council. The Corporate Plan identifies the top ten things the Council need to get right and the top ten things they need to improve.

This SPD will support the key themes of the Corporate Plan:

- Creating safe and liveable areas
- Accessible communities
- Planning ahead to retain and enhance the strong Charnwood economy.

28. Quorn is situated in north Leicestershire some two miles south from Loughborough within the Soar valley.

29. The Quorn Village Design Statement reflects the views of the people of Quorn. A number of events have been held to encourage participation,

- A Public Meeting was held to gauge interest in the production of a Village Design Statement in Autumn 2005. As there appeared to be sufficient support another meeting to progress the idea was arranged for January 2006.
- A dedicated page on the Village Web Site was used to promote the development of a VDS, allow the village to see what was going on and encourage comment.
- Additional local publicity was given by the village quarterly magazine, The Quorndon, which is delivered to every house in the village, covering the QVDS in an introductory article and subsequently in various updates.
- On the 6th May 2006 the village May Day celebration was used to mount a small exhibition of the activities of the VDS Group to date. This was very successful with many villagers coming through and talking with the committee about the village and the work we were doing.
- On Friday 7th April 2006 all 300+ pupils at St. Bartholomew's Primary School were given a sheet of A4 paper and asked to depict their favourite Quorn building and say why they had chosen it. At the end of the Easter Holiday over 200 replies were collected and from these the best for each year group was chosen plus an overall winner.
- 20th May 2006 One of the first public acts of the Committee was to hold a Village Walkabout. This involved four teams made up of a mixture of committee members and other interested villagers. Each team took a quarter of the village, taking pictures of interesting buildings, their features, groupings and settings. With these as a bank we could get a better "feel" of the village and also use these as a resource to draw on to illustrate our final document.
- On the weekend of 24th/25th June 2006 the committee filled the Church Rooms with a large exhibition laying out virtually everything we could gather about Quorn. This included our work to date, photos of the village including the ones we had taken on the Walkabout earlier in the year, maps, diagrams, and all the drawings/paintings made by the Primary School children. During the Exhibition the year group prizes were officially presented by Jeremy Prescott, Head of the Rural Community Council (Leicestershire and Rutland) and the overall prize was presented by Gary Crisp whose house was drawn by the overall winner. This drawing will be incorporated in the final document.
- By the end of July 2007 the committee, which had been working hard in subject oriented sub-committees and latterly as a whole, produced the 1st public version of the QVDS. This was then presented to the Charnwood Borough Council's (CBC) Planning Department for their oversight and comments.
- By the end of October 2007 the document, suitably annotated, was returned. Additionally Renia had a meeting with Françoise Scire, CBC's Environmental Officer, to discuss alterations to the environmental part of the QVDS so that it was in line with new legislation that had been enacted since we had originally started work on the QVDS.
- On 15th November 2007 our committee discussed the proposed additions & alterations suggested by CBC and the incorporation of our version of these into the 2nd Version of the QVDS. This altered document was submitted to CBC in mid December 2007 for their overview and forwarding to other interested parties for further comments.

30. A sustainability framework has been drawn up to assess consistently the component documents of the Charnwood's Development Framework. This framework takes account of the objectives of national, regional and local planning policy, other strategies,

plans and programmes and the context of the economic, social and environmental characteristics of Charnwood. The sustainability framework sets out sustainability objectives against which the proposals will be measured to assess significant effects. The sustainability framework is set out in Appendix II.

SPD Issues and Options

31. Two options were considered in relation to preparing additional guidance on protecting the special character of Quorn:

- to prepare a Village Design Statement setting out the characteristics and features which make Quorn distinctive and identify key principles to guide the design of new development;
- to undertake a ‘Business as Usual’ approach and rely on the existing Local Plan Policy EV/1 supplemented by other existing national, regional and local planning policy.

32. Although the Local Plan provides broad guidance there is some concern about recent development. A ‘Business as Usual Approach’ has the potential to have the same economic, social and environmental effects but is less likely to take account of local features. A village design statement will ensure that the design and layout of the new development makes full use of the opportunities available whilst remaining compatible with the character and appearance of the village and surrounding landscape.

SPD Policies

33. The policies of the Quorn Village Design Statement SPD have been assessed individually against the sustainability objectives. The individual assessments are set out in Appendix III which is available on the Council’s website or by request. A summary is given in Appendix IV. The effects will be greater for some objectives than others. Table A illustrates those policies which will significantly or marginally support the sustainability objectives. Individual policies have been grouped under the main guideline headings for the purpose of this appraisal in order to establish a more significant assessment.

34. Table A illustrates that the Quorn Village Design Statement SPD scores well for positive effects for 7 of the sustainability objectives. Significant positive effects are scored by 4 of the 5 policy issues in the document. These relate mainly to the environmental objectives, which due to the overall aim of the SPD is to be expected. No negative effects were identified.
35. Material assets and social objectives score adequately for marginal positive effects, with 2 of the 5 policies registering a score in this category and 1 of the policies score positively against the economic objectives.
36. In summary, there is a recurring theme relating to sustainable design and construction techniques that are not adequately covered by the policies of the Quorn Village Design Statement SPD. However it is noted that the objectives of the Quorn Village Design Statement SPD clearly indicate that development should continue in an environmentally sustainable manner. The issues listed below could be adequately addressed through the policies of this SPD by a general reference directing to further guidance in the *Leading in Design SPD* stated in the Aims & Objectives.
- surface and groundwater quality, minimising water consumption and reducing flood risk;
 - re-use of soil resources;
 - to reducing greenhouse gas emissions through less car use, energy efficient design and use of renewable energy;
 - design and construction techniques that take into account the need to be adaptable to temperature change and possible increased flood risk;
 - sustainable extraction, re use and recycling of minerals and aggregates resources and building materials;
 - to reducing, re-use and recycling of waste materials;
 - minimise the use of energy and optimise the use of renewable resources;
 - techniques to reduce crime, the fear of crime and anti-social behaviour;
37. The outcome of Quorn Village Design Statement SPD is potentially uncertain because:
- Implementation is dependent upon developers, Council officers and Councillors applying the principles set out in the SPD;
 - The impacts of climate change are uncertain.

Implementation

38. The Quorn Village Design Statement SPD sits within the local planning framework through its link to Local Plan Policy EV/1. Further guidance is set out in the adopted *Leading in Design SPD* which is a framework for securing good design and sustainable construction techniques under the umbrella of the Charnwood Development Framework.
39. The overarching sustainability appraisal framework will set out indicators against which to measure the sustainability effects of implementing the component documents of the Charnwood's Development Framework. Such monitoring will enable any unforeseen undesirable effects and so enable corrective action to be taken. It is proposed to develop a single monitoring system for the various components of the Local Development Framework. This will be reported through an Annual Monitoring Report.

40. The indicators which could be used to monitor the Quorn Village Design Statement SPD are:

- Changes in areas of designated biodiversity habitats;
- Loss of greenfield land
- Number of planning permissions granted contrary to advice on flood defence or water quality
- Loss or damage to listed buildings and their settings
- Percentage of new dwellings and conversions of existing buildings, on previously developed land.
