You then almost reach the road but turn right just before it to walk through a small car park and then along a pretty path that runs parallel to the wall and the road. When you reach the end of the wood there is a narrow gap in the wall on your left leading out to the roadside. Almost opposite and just to your right there is a footpath signposted to Old John. Follow this path, cross the stile at the end and enter the park by the gate in the wall. Here you turn right and follow the wall back to the gate for the Old John car park.

For the longer version (see point A) continue on through the village away from the Griffin. You pass the war memorial and Memorial Hall on the right and later the White House on the left. Swithland is a long thin village so this part will take around 20 minutes. Just before the 30mph sign take a signed footpath on the left. You can see by the wall on each side of this path that at one time this path was the 'working' track that led to

the quarry in Swithland Wood. After crossing the second stile you are in Swithland Wood. Keep to a pathway and track, which starts straight ahead and stays roughly the same direction for a good distance. You pass picnic tables on the right, and later a plaque saying how the wood was acquired by Rotary in 1931. You are then at point B on the shorter version and continue by walking straight ahead.

## Notes

(1) Old John Tower was built in 1786 on the site of an old windmill, and it is the highest point in the park. The story is that Old John was a retainer of the Grey family who was killed by a falling maypole during a coming-of-age party for a relative of the Earl of Starnford. At a distance the shape resembles a beer mug. The memorial is said to reflect Old John's partiality for ale.

(2) Swithland village was once famous for the slate produced from quarries in Swithland Wood. Many of the houses in the village are built with local materials, including the slate on the roofs. St Leonards churchyard also contains some slate memorials.
